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INTRODUCTION

By the Chief Gambling Commissioner

I am pleased to present to you my annual report for the period 1 July 2024 to 30 June 2025. In this reporting period, the Commission undertook work on two matters of great importance to the gambling industry in New Zealand. First, the Commission recommended and approved the introduction of Account Based Play at SkyCity's three casinos and secondly, the Commission made recommendations on the Problem Gambling Levy for 2025-2028.

Two significant pieces of work that were commenced in the last reporting year were concluded; an application by the Secretary for Internal Affairs (the "**Secretary**") to suspend SkyCity from operating for a period of time, and an application by Dunedin Casinos Limited to renew its casino venue licence.

REPORT ON ACTIVITIES

Role and function of the Commission

The Commission was established under the Gambling Act 2003 (the “Act”). It is an independent decision-making body with the powers of a Commission of Inquiry. The duties and functions of the Commission, which are set out in Appendix 1 to this report, include specifying, varying and revoking casino licence conditions, and considering and determining appeals against regulatory and licensing decisions made by the Department of Internal Affairs (the “Department”) in respect of Class 3 and Class 4 gambling.

The Commission must make decisions independently of the Minister and the Secretary for Internal Affairs.

All decisions of the Commission are available publicly on the Commission’s website www.gamblingcommission.govt.nz.

Membership

The Act provides that the Commission shall comprise up to five Commissioners.

The Chief Gambling Commissioner is Susan Hughes KC, a Barrister based in New Plymouth. The other four Commissioners are:

- Scott Pearson, a Business Consultant based in Auckland;
- William (Bill) Acton, a Barrister based in Wellington;
- Sarah Shaw, a Barrister based in Whangarei; and
- Carolyn Risk, a Barrister and Public Sector Consultant based in Christchurch.

Casino Sector

The Department is responsible for operating and equipment standards, game rules and compliance. The Commission is responsible for casino licensing. The Commission’s decisions on licensing matters can be appealed to the High Court.

There are five casinos in New Zealand, details of which are shown in the table (right), including the gambling product deployed at each. New casinos are prohibited under the Act.

SKYCITY is the largest operator, operating casinos in Hamilton, Queenstown and the country’s largest casino in Auckland.

In the year ending 30 June 2025, the Commission made 149 decisions on casino matters. Applications related mainly to approval of new signage around the casinos, revised floor layouts and new game mixes. This compares with 107 decisions made last year.

Application to suspend SkyCity

In last year’s Report, the Commission addressed the application by the Secretary for an order to suspend the casino operator’s licence held by SkyCity Casino Management Limited. The Secretary alleged that SkyCity did not comply with the requirements of its Host Responsibility Programme for the Auckland casino in that SkyCity did not detect incidences of continuous play by a gambling patron. The Secretary sought a suspension in the range of 10 days.

The Commission scheduled the Secretary’s application for a hearing but before the hearing was convened, SkyCity and the Secretary informed the Commission that a resolution had been reached. SkyCity acknowledged its non-compliance and agreed to close the gambling operations at the Auckland casino for five consecutive days. The closure took place in September 2024.

Application to renew casino venue licence for Dunedin Casino

In June 2023, Dunedin Casinos Limited (“DCL”) applied to the Commission to renew the casino venue licence for the Dunedin Casino. The Commission reported on this matter in last year’s Report and noted that the

public hearing of the application would take place in the 2024/25 reporting year.

The Commission held a public hearing in Dunedin on 20 September 2024 and released its written decision on 26 February 2025. The Commission renewed the casino venue licence for the Dunedin casino for a further 15 years. Licence conditions attached to DCL's casino venue licence were largely unchanged with the only amendments being to condition 14, the charitable trust licence condition. DCL is now required to pay annually not less than 1% of Casino Win to the casino's charitable trust. Condition 14 also set out DCL's obligations to report to the Commission on its annual payments to the charitable trust.

Application to renew casino venue licence for Queenstown Casino

In August 2024, SkyCity Queenstown Limited applied to the Commission, under section 134 of the Act, to renew the casino venue licence for the Queenstown Casino located at Level 2, 16-24 Beach Street, Queenstown. The process for determining a licence renewal application is set out in section 135 of the Act, which the Commission is following.

The Commission is advancing the renewal application to a public hearing in Queenstown. The Commission will be required to decide whether to renew the licence for a further 15 years.

The public hearing will take place in the 2025/26 year and will be reported on in next year's annual report.

Review of SkyCity's Host Responsibility Programmes – Account Based Play

Licence conditions attached to the operator's licences for each casino provide that the Commission will review the Host Responsibility Programmes ("HRPs") for each casino every three years. The Commission completed reviews for all five casinos in 2024. In May 2025, and approximately 18 months after its last review, SkyCity submitted to the Commission updated HRPs for the Auckland, Hamilton and Queenstown casinos for approval. The HRPs proposed a limited number of amendments in order to introduce Account Based Play (sometimes referred to as Carded Play or Mandatory Carded Play) to its three New Zealand casinos as soon as possible. The Commission noted the significance of this development in last year's Report.

The Commission invited submissions on SkyCity's proposed HRPs but did not conclude its consideration

of them within this reporting year. The outcome of the Commission's review will be reported on in next year's Report.

Application by SkyCity Auckland Limited for approval to construct an enlarged smoking balcony capable of deploying gaming machines

The Commission considered an application by SkyCity Auckland Limited to enlarge an existing outdoor gambling area at the Auckland casino where patrons can both smoke and play gaming machines. The Commission consulted widely on the application and engaged an expert to review and report on the academic literature relating to concurrent gambling and smoking.

The Commission approved the application. In its decision, the Commission noted that although a comparatively high proportion of problem gamblers are also smokers, the evidence did not establish a causative connection. The Commission also noted that the available statistics indicated that declining approval for an expanded smoking deck would have a greater adverse effect on non-problem gamblers who smoke and derive enjoyment from combining both lawful activities than a justified beneficial effect on problem gambling.

SkyCity cannot yet deploy gaming machines in the enlarged outdoor gambling area. In addition to obtaining an approval from the Commission to enlarge the area, SkyCity must also seek approval of a new floor plan that depicts the exact location of each gaming machine in the outdoor area.

A number of submissions made in respect of the application to enlarge the outdoor gambling area may need to be reconsidered as part of that application.

Review of Cash Access Licence Conditions

In last year's Report, the Commission reported that it intended to move to stage two of its planned two-staged review. The Commission, however, did not substantively advance stage two as it awaited the Secretary's development of Account Based Play Standards and for SkyCity to submit updated HRPs, which allowed for the introduction of Account Based (mandatory, carded) Play.

The Gambling (Casino Mandatory Account Based Play) Minimum Standard 2025 came into effect in April 2025 and SkyCity submitted updated HRPs

in May 2025. The Commission will resume its review and report on it in next year's Report.

Appeals to the Commission

The Department exercises primary licensing and enforcement functions in relation to non-casino gambling. Operators have rights of appeal to the Commission against decisions made by the Department in circumstances including loss of licence, enforcement action and in relation to the imposition of licence conditions by the Department. An appeal is heard on a de novo basis, meaning that the Commission considers the matter afresh.

The Commission determined five appeals in the year ending 30 June 2025.

BlueSky Community Trust

The Commission considered two appeals by BlueSky Community Trust against decisions refusing to amend its Policy for Identifying Problem Gamblers ("PIPG") and its Venue Statement on how it proposed to minimise the risk of problem and underage gambling at its venues.

The issues on both appeals arose from amendments to the Gambling (Harm Prevention and Minimisation) Regulations 2004 with particular reference to the application of new Regulations 15 and 16 to BlueSky's PIPG and the Venue Statement. BlueSky had proposed amendments to its PIPG and Venue Statement in response to Regulations 15 and 16 and had sought approval of the amendments from the Secretary. The Secretary refused to provide an approval.

In the first appeal decision, the Commission declined to confirm, reverse or vary the decision of the Secretary to refuse to amend BlueSky's licence by approving the proposed changes to its problem gambling policies. Instead, the Commission referred the matter back to the Secretary with directions to reconsider the decision, with the expectation that observations made in the Commission's written decision might assist the parties to resolve the differences in their viewpoints.

Following the release of the first decision, BlueSky and the Secretary engaged in discussions to resolve their areas of disagreement regarding the PIPG and Venue Statement. While agreement was reached on some matters of initial contention, agreement was not reached on the content of clause 21 of BlueSky's Venue Statement with regard to the regulatory requirements to have a conversation with gamblers in certain circumstances. BlueSky appealed to the Commission.

In the second appeal decision, the Commission noted that it may confirm, vary, or reverse the Secretary's decision. The Commission decided to vary the decision of the Secretary by approving an amended version of clause 21, which was a simplified revision of the text proposed by BlueSky.

Blue Waters Community Trust and Pub Charity Limited

The Commission was required to consider the effect of a High Court decision, *Feed Families Not Pokies Aotearoa Inc. v Secretary for Internal Affairs* ("FFNPA"), in appeals by Blue Waters Community Trust and Pub Charity Limited. The appeals were unrelated but were determined at the same meeting by the Commission.

Blue Waters and Pub Charity had each (separately) applied to the Department to amend the address of one of their (respective) Class 4 venues. Both applications were made with reference to *ILT Foundation v the Secretary for Internal Affairs*, a decision of the High Court from 2013. This effect of this decision, commonly referred to as the *Waikivi* decision, was that, provided that four criteria were met, insignificant site movements did not constitute a change of venue.

In September 2013, and after the *Waikivi* decision, the Gambling (Gambling Harm Reduction) Amendment Act 2013, came into effect. The Amendment Act gave territorial authorities the ability to adopt relocation policies and determine whether venues within their jurisdiction could relocate.

In February 2024, the High Court released its decision in *FFNPA*. The Court declared that small site movements permitted under the *Waikivi* decision without territorial authority consent constituted relocations requiring territorial authority consent, since the Amendment Act came into effect in September 2013.

Relying upon the *FFNPA* decision, the Secretary issued decision letters to Blue Waters and Pub Charity, refusing to amend the Class 4 venue licence for each venue. Blue Waters and Pub Charity both appealed to the Commission.

The Commission considered the 2013 *Waikivi* decision and the 2024 *FFNPA* decision. The Commission determined that it was bound to apply the *FFNPA* decision as a correct statement of the prevailing law concerning site movements since September 2013. The Commission saw no lack of clarity or ambiguity in the two High Court decisions – the *Waikivi* decision

considered the Act prior to the 2013 amendments, while the *FFNPA* decision concerned the effect of those amendments on site movements.

On both appeals, the Commission confirmed the decisions of the Secretary to refuse to amend the Appellants' (respective) licences.

Report on Problem Gambling Levy

On 13 February 2025, the Commission made recommendations to the Minister for Mental Health and the Minister of Internal Affairs on the total amount of the proposed Problem Gambling Levy for a three-year period, 1 July 2025 – 30 June 2028, and the proposed levy rate for each sector. The Commission convened a consultation meeting on 31 January 2025 to assist it in making its recommendations and obtained expert, independent, advice on the Ministry of Health's funding plan.

In previous recommendations to Ministers, the Commission had broadly supported the Ministry's proposed approach and funding requirements (albeit with numerous additional recommendations). However, in its 2025 Report, the Commission did not endorse either.

The Commission's 2025 recommendations had their genesis in its 2022 Report to Ministers, and in earlier Reports prepared for the Commission by its expert. In its 2022 Report, the Commission explicitly stated that, although it supported the Ministry's strategy, it "attached a significant caveat to this support in so far as it might be seen to represent an ongoing endorsement of a similar approach in future levy rounds". The Commission recommended that the Ministry "should undertake a major strategic review of its problem gambling strategy and use that review to determine the necessary funding requirements". The Ministry did not undertake any review so its proposals for 2025-28 were essentially the same as those from 2022.

After considering the evidence presented to it, the Commission reached a view that it could not support the Ministry's proposed funding increase for the following reasons:

- i. The Commission was not provided with evidence that the Ministry's Strategy and Service Plans had achieved the most basic outcome of preventing and minimising harm, nor that the current Strategy has had a substantial impact on the level of gambling harm in New Zealand.

- ii. The absence of a monitoring and reporting framework for the Strategy meant that it is not clear to the Commission or its expert what aspects of the Ministry's Strategy were working and what were not.
- iii. The failure to review the Strategy and assess the costs required to implement a refreshed Strategy meant it is not clear to the Commission or its expert that the sum sought by the Ministry was appropriate.
- iv. As the Ministry did not spend all of its budget from the current period, the Commission could not endorse an increase of the magnitude sought in the absence of clear evidence of the benefit of existing expenditure and a compelling basis for the proposed increase, particularly in relation to agency costs.

The Commission's recommendations were as follows:

- i. The total amount of the levy for the period 1 July 2025–30 June 2028 should be set at \$76.123 million, as it is for the 2022-25 levy period. The Commission did not support the increased sum sought by the Ministry, of \$91.805 million.
- ii. The weightings of W1 (expenditure) and W2 (presentations) should be set at 35:65.
- iii. The Ministry should undertake its planned impact evaluation of the Strategy. The evaluation should have independent oversight to ensure that it is rigorous and takes place in a timely manner.

After receiving the Commission's 2025 Report, Ministers set the levy at \$81 million, rather than \$76 million as recommended by the Commission, or \$91 million, as sought by the Ministry.

Section 81 Complaint

In August 2024, the Commission released its view following a complaint made against the Secretary, under section 81(3) of the Act, in relation to the Secretary's handling of a matter. This was the first such complaint made to the Commission.

Section 81 permits a person to make a complaint to the Secretary about the conduct of Class 4 gambling at a Class 4 venue or by a Class 4 operator. The Secretary must investigate the complaint as soon as practicable and notify the complainant about whether any action has been, or will be, taken in respect of the complaint. Section 81(3) provides that the complainant may complain to the Gambling Commission about the way the Secretary has handled the complaint.

In May 2024, Feed Families Not Pokies Aotearoa Inc, lodged a complaint with the Secretary concerning the continuing operation of Toucan Bar & Bistro, Albany, after the expiration of its alcohol on-licence. The complaint attached a hearings report of the Auckland District Licensing Committee, which included a Police report on the operation of the Venue. The Police report stated that, after the Venue's tavern on-licence expired, the operator continued to sell alcohol at the Venue, in breach of the alcohol legislation, until the Venue was closed by the Police. It also stated that the Venue had operated Class 4 gambling in breach of the Gambling Act. The Secretary responded to FFNPA two weeks after receiving the letter, addressing the matters raised. FFNPA was not satisfied that the Secretary had investigated the complaint, or taken action, as section 81(2) required. It complained to the Commission under section 81(3) of the Act.

As stipulated by the Act, the Commission required the Secretary to provide a report about the way that FFNPA's complaint was handled, and it considered the matter in light of that report.

The Commission considered that the Secretary had complied with the procedural requirements of section 81(2). FFNPA's complaint was made to the Secretary in the middle of May 2024, it was investigated and was the subject of a comprehensive written response to FFNPA by the end of May. The Commission was satisfied that the Secretary's response was given within a reasonable time having regard to the nature of the complaint.

In respect of the section 81(3) complaint, the Commission was of the view that the Secretary's actions were appropriate in the circumstances and that no further action by him was required.

The Commission notified both the Secretary and FFNPA of its view that the Secretary's handling of the original complaint was appropriate.

Sector Engagement

In the year ended 30 June 2025, the Commission maintained regular contact with stakeholders, including representatives from the Casinos, the Class 4 sector, the Department, the Ministry of Health, and treatment providers. The Secretariat met with gambling regulators in Australian jurisdictions on a broad range of issues. The Secretariat also briefed Australian gambling regulators on the Commission's work.

The Commission continues to keep abreast of relevant gambling issues at both governance and management levels.

Procedures

In exercising its functions, the Commission has wide powers to determine its own procedures, to engage experts and to receive evidence. The policies and procedures developed by the Commission, and the decisions which it makes, are all published on its website.

Appeal proceedings are run along judicial lines. Procedures involve filing of submissions and affidavit evidence by the appellant, submissions and evidence in response by the respondent Secretary (Department), and submissions and evidence in reply from the appellant.

The Commission consults on applications to amend licence conditions with the casino licence holder, the Secretary and affected persons. The Commission's decisions on casino licensing matters are subject to appeal to the High Court.

The Commission can, and does, obtain independent legal advice in relation to matters under consideration – both casino applications and appeals.

In addition to its decisions, the Commission (mainly through the Secretariat) communicates regularly with stakeholders.

Administration

The Commission has no power to acquire, hold or alienate property, or to employ staff. Instead, the Act requires the Department to service the Commission, by arranging the administrative services necessary for the Commission to perform its functions.

The Act also requires the Commission to make decisions independently of the Minister and the Secretary, and to have a stand-alone office. This is in Auckland, where the Secretariat is based.

The Commission is funded from the Department's Vote but, as noted above, is functionally independent. The Commission's annual expenditure is variable, depending upon the volume of applications and appeals before it, and any litigation with which it is involved.

Commission Meetings

The Commission met 14 times during the year under review: 12 July, 9 August, 13 September, 20 September, 11 October, 8 November, 6 December, 18 December 2024, 14 February, 14 March, 11 April, 16 May, 13 and 30 June 2025. The majority of the Commission's meetings were held online.

Future Work Programme

The focus of the Commission in 2025/2026 will be the following activities:

- Consider the application by SkyCity Queenstown Ltd to renew its venue licence.
 - Consider a forthcoming application by SkyCity Hamilton Ltd to renew its venue licence.
 - Continuing with its review of the cash access licence conditions.
 - The ongoing effective discharge of its licensing and appeal functions.
 - Continuing to meet with the interested parties and participants in the sector.
 - Keeping the Minister informed of developments relating to the Commission's functions.

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APPENDIX 1

Duties and Functions of the Commission under the Act

The Commission is an independent decision-making body with the powers of a Commission of Inquiry. Its functions are wide-ranging, and include the following:

- specifying, varying and revoking casino licence conditions
- considering and determining applications for casino operators' licences and the renewal of casino venue licences
- approving agreements and changes to agreements between casino operators and casino venue licence holders
- considering and determining appeals against regulatory and licensing decisions made by the Department in respect of Class 3 and Class 4 gambling. Class 3 gambling involves prizes of more than \$5,000 but does not take place at a casino or involve gaming machines. Class 4 gambling relates to non-casino gaming machine operations
- considering and dealing with complaints about the way the Department has handled complaints in relation to Class 4 gambling
- advising the Minister for Internal Affairs on matters relating to the performance of the Commission's functions and the administration of the Act, either at the Minister's request or on its own initiative
- advising Ministers and facilitating consultation on the setting of the problem gambling levy.
