# INTRODUCTION

By the Chief Gambling Commissioner

I am pleased to present to you my annual report for the period 1 July 2018 to 30 June 2019, the Commission's fourteenth full year of operation.

The Commission has a mixture of regulatory, judicial and advisory functions in relation to gambling and the gambling sector. The functions most regularly exercised by the Commission involve determining applications for approval under casino licence conditions, amending casino licence conditions and considering appeals from gaming machine operators against decisions made by the Department of Internal Affairs (the "**Department**").

In the last year the Commission determined 154 applications to amend casino licence conditions or grant approvals under casino licence conditions.

# REPORT ON ACTIVITIES

## Establishment of the Commission

The Commission was established in March 2004 by section 220 of the Gambling Act 2003 (the “Act”). The Act provides that the Commission shall comprise up to five Commissioners.

The Chief Gambling Commissioner is Graeme Reeves, a barrister and solicitor based in Wellington. Graeme was a Gambling Commissioner from 2004 to December 2010, when he was appointed as the Chief Gambling Commissioner. The other Commissioners are:

- Lisa Hansen, who is a Wellington barrister;
- Donna Matahaere-Atariki, who is a consultant and lives in Dunedin;
- Wendie Harvey, who is a professional director and business consultant and lives in Hawke’s Bay; and
- Scott Pearson, who is a professional director and consultant and lives in Auckland.

The Commission is serviced by an Auckland-based Secretariat.

The duties and functions of the Commission are set out in Appendix 1 to this report.

## Casinos

The Commission is responsible for casino licensing, with the Department being responsible for operating and equipment standards, game rules and compliance. Casinos can appeal the Commission’s decisions on licensing matters to the High Court.

In the year ending 30 June 2019, the Commission made 154 decisions on applications to amend licence conditions or obtain approvals under licence conditions. Applications related mainly to approval of new signage around the casinos, revised floor layouts and new game mixes. This compares with 150 decisions made last year.

New Zealand has six casinos (new ones being prohibited under the Act), varying considerably in size, as shown below:

SKYCITY is the dominant operator in New Zealand, operating four of the six casinos; one in Auckland, one in Hamilton and two in Queenstown. The Auckland casino is by far the largest, with approval to operate up to 150 table games, 1,877 gaming machines and 240 fully automated table games. The Auckland casino previously operated up to 110 gaming tables and 1,647 gaming machines but can now deploy additional gambling products up to the abovementioned levels pursuant to the New Zealand International Convention Centre Act 2013, which gives effect to the New Zealand International Convention Centre Project and Licensing Agreement between SKYCITY and the Crown.

### *Christchurch Casinos Limited – Application to renew its casino venue licence*

In decision GC05/19, the Commission granted an application by CCL for renewal of its casino venue licence, thereby permitting Christchurch casino to operate for a further 15 years from the expiry of its original licence on 3 November 2019.

Under the Act, before renewing the licence, the Commission had to be satisfied that:

- the licence holder and persons with a significant influence at the casino were suitable; and
- the compliance record of the licence holder and persons with a significant influence at the casino was satisfactory; and
- renewing the licence would result in a net benefit to the local and regional communities around the casino, and to New Zealand generally.

In considering whether there was a net benefit, the Commission had to consider:

- the social and economic effects of granting, or refusing to grant, the renewal; and
- the level of support for the application, including the result of any poll conducted by the local authority; and
- the nature and standard of the casino facilities.

The Commission was satisfied of all of these essential matters.

To satisfy the Commission that the licence holder and persons with a significant influence at the casino were suitable, and that the compliance record of the licence holder and persons with a significant influence at the casino was satisfactory, the Commission relied upon detailed personal information obtained from the Applicant and persons with influence, and upon reports from the Department, the Police, NZ Insolvency and Trustee Services and the Companies Office.

As to net benefit, the Commission relied upon a Casino Impact Report (“CIR”) prepared by consultants (whom it had earlier approved as independent of the casino), critical peer review reports by a leading Australian academic with special expertise in gambling, as well as the submissions received throughout the feedback process, including submissions from the public, following public notices and local newspaper coverage.

The CIR identified both social benefits and net positive economic benefits locally, regionally and nationally, which would be lost if the renewal application were refused. It took into account the cost, both social and economic, associated with the incidence of harm.

The submissions strongly favoured renewal, with a very substantial majority supporting renewal and with fewer than 10% opposing. Although Christchurch City

Council did not conduct a local opinion poll, it ultimately supported the renewal application and was the only representative submitter. Other potential community representatives who were contacted and invited to make submissions did not respond.

The casino facilities were judged to be entirely satisfactory.

In addition to granting the renewal application, the Commission also considered whether the casino venue licence conditions should be amended.

Of the proposed amendments suggested by submitters, the Commission adopted only one; namely, amendments to impose minimum contributions by the casino to an independent charitable trust which it is required to support.

The Commission imposed a minimum contribution of the greater of 2.5% of the net profit after tax from the casino site activities, or \$250,000, coupled with a further \$100,000 in either direct charitable payments by the casino or further contribution to the trust.

## Appeals to the Commission

The Department exercises primary licensing and enforcement functions in relation to non-casino gambling (gaming machines and large-scale lotteries). As at 30 June 2019, there were 235 licensed Class 4 gambling operators, 1,094 gaming machine venues and 15,007 gaming machines in New Zealand (down from 253, 1,140 and 15,420 respectively in 2018, and down significantly from the 25,221 gaming machines that were in place in June 2003).

Operators have rights of appeal to the Commission against decisions made by the Department in circumstances including loss of licence, enforcement action and in relation to the imposition of licence conditions by the Department.

The Commission determined one appeal in the year ending 30 June 2019.

An appeal is heard on a *de novo* basis, meaning that the Commission considers the matter afresh.

### *Decision GC04/19 – Appeal by New Zealand Community Trust (“NZCT”) – Counties Inn, Pukekohe*

NZCT appealed against a decision made by the Secretary refusing to amend NZCT’s class 4 venue licence to record a change of physical address for the Counties Inn, Pukekohe. The substantive issue on

appeal was whether territorial authority consent under section 98(c) of the Act was required to change the physical location or address of a class 4 venue in a situation where:

- the relevant territorial authority has a relocation policy (even one that does not permit any movement); and
- the proposed move is minor in scope and meets all four criteria set out in the High Court decision in *ILT Foundation v Secretary for Internal Affairs* (“*Waikiwi*”), namely the new building remaining close to the existing venue, the tavern’s name remaining the same, ownership and management staying the same, and patrons and the public regarding the tavern as having retained its venue.

In *Waikiwi*, the High Court found that movement of a class 4 venue premises, where those four criteria are met, does not constitute a change of venue, requiring an application for a new venue licence and territorial consent under section 98 of the Act. Both NZCT and the Secretary agreed that the *Waikiwi* criteria were met in this case.

The issue for the Commission was whether the *Waikiwi* decision continues to apply following the Gambling (Gambling Harm Reduction) Amendment Act 2013 (“**Amendment**”), enacted after *Waikiwi* was decided. The Amendment provided for corporate societies to retain their gaming machine numbers when they relocate with the consent of the territorial authority pursuant to that authority’s relocation policy (if there is one) (section 98(c) of the Act).

In this case, NZCT neither obtained Auckland Council’s consent, nor applied to relocate under the Amendment. It merely sought an amendment to its licence to change the venue’s recorded address on the basis that the recorded move was not a change of venue, triggering the application of section 98(c) of the Act.

The Secretary declined NZCT’s application to amend on the basis that territorial authority consent was required, even if the move fell within the *Waikiwi* framework.

NZCT submitted that the Secretary’s decision was wrong and that because the *Waikiwi* criteria were met, there was no proposal to change the venue in accordance with Auckland Council’s relocation policy and no territorial consent was required.

The Commission agreed with NZCT. A movement that meets the *Waikiwi* criteria is not a change of venue requiring territorial consent. As there was no dispute

that the application fell within the *Waikiwi* criteria, the ordinary process for amending a licence applies.

Applications for an amendment to a venue licence proceed under section 73, which requires the application to meet the requirements of section 66 and 67. While section 67(1)(f) requires territorial consent if section 98 applies, in the Commission’s view, no such consent was required. There was no dispute that the requirements of sections 66 and 67 were otherwise met in this case.

The Commission therefore considered that the Secretary erred and that NZCT’s application to amend should have been granted. The Commission reversed the decision of the Secretary to refuse to amend the licence to record the change of address of the Counties Inn and directed that the Secretary issue the amended licence sought.

## Miscellaneous

### *Report on Problem Gambling Levy*

On 13 February 2019, the Commission made recommendations to the Minister of Internal Affairs and the Associate Minister of Health on the total amount of the proposed problem gambling levy for the three-year period 1 July 2019–30 June 2022, and the proposed levy rate for each gambling sector. The Commission convened a consultation meeting on 30 January 2019 as part of its process to make recommendations and obtained independent expert advice on the Ministry of Health’s funding plan.

The Commission’s main recommendation was to amend the formula weighting for 2019–2022, with a 70 percent weighting to be placed on the number of people presenting to problem gambling providers and a 30 percent weighting to be placed on the amount of money lost gambling.

Cabinet decided to adopt the Commission’s recommendation.

Regulations specifying the levy rate, the Gambling (Problem Gambling Levy) Regulations 2019, commenced on 1 July 2019.

In the year ended 30 June 2019, the Commission completed its review of the Host Responsibility Programmes for the Auckland, Hamilton, Queenstown, Wharf and Dunedin casinos.

The Commission maintained regular contact with stakeholders throughout the year, including representatives from all six casinos, the Class 4 sector, the Department, the Ministry of Health, researchers and treatment providers. The Commission also met with gambling regulators in Australian jurisdictions and briefed them on the Commission's work.

The Commission continues to keep abreast of relevant gambling issues at both governance and management levels.

### Procedures

In exercising its functions, the Commission has wide powers to determine its own procedures, to engage experts and to receive evidence. The policies and procedures developed by the Commission, and the decisions which it makes, are all published on its website.

Appeal proceedings are run along judicial lines. Procedures involve filing of submissions and affidavit evidence by the appellant, submissions and evidence in response by the respondent Secretary, and submissions and evidence in reply from the appellant.

The Commission consults on applications to amend licence conditions with the casino licence holder, the Secretary and affected persons.

The Commission can, and does, obtain independent legal advice in relation to matters under consideration – both casino applications and appeals.

Apart from its decisions, the Commission (mainly through the Commission Secretariat) communicates on an ongoing basis with stakeholders.

### Administration

Under the Act, the Commission has no power to acquire, hold or alienate property, or to employ staff. Instead, the Act requires the Department to service the Commission, by arranging the administrative services necessary for the Commission to perform its functions.

The Act also requires the Commission to make decisions independently of the Minister and the Secretary, and to have a stand-alone office. This is located in Auckland.

The Commission is funded from the Department's Vote, but as noted above, is functionally independent. The Commission's annual expenditure is variable, depending upon the volume of applications and appeals before it, and any litigation with which it is involved.

### Commission Meetings

The Commission met 12 times during the year under review: 6 July, 3 August, 7 September, 8 October, 2 November, 4-6 December 2018, and 30 January, 15 February, 15 March, 12 April, 16 May and 7 June 2019.

The Executive Director and a Gambling Commissioner attended the International Association of Gaming Regulators Conference in Denmark in September 2018.

The Executive Director attended the Australasian Casino & Gaming Regulators' CEOs meeting in Melbourne in October 2018.

The Chief Gambling Commissioner attended the meeting of Gambling Regulatory Boards and Commissioners in Adelaide in October 2018.

Gambling Commissioners and the Executive Director attended a conference of Australasian Gambling Regulators in Western Australia in May 2019.

### Future Directions

The primary focus of the Commission in 2019/2020 will be the following activities:

- The Gambling Commission has received an application from SKYCITY Casino Management Limited ("SCML") and SKYCITY Hamilton Limited ("SHL") proposing a number of changes to the Hamilton casino. In particular, SKYCITY is seeking to deploy 60 additional gaming machines in substitution for three Black Jack tables and has filed four related applications with the Commission to enable it to do so.

SKYCITY brought the applications because it wants to alter the mix of gaming tables and gaming machines that are deployed at the Hamilton casino in a manner contemplated by section 12(2)(a) of the Act. That is, it wants to increase the number of gaming machines in exchange for a decrease in the number of gaming tables.

Although section 12 of the Act has been in force since 2003, SKYCITY's proposal is the first occasion on which a casino has applied to the Commission to increase its gaming machines in exchange for a reduction in table games.

The application has generated considerable public interest in the Hamilton and Waikato communities. Having regard to the novelty of the proposed change and the extent of local community interest, the

Commission decided to broaden the scope of its consultation and to hold a public hearing.

The Commission invited submissions from the public at large, receiving approximately 250 submissions.

The Commission also invited applications from those who sought to appear and be heard at the public hearing. The Commission authorised appearances by SKYCITY and six other parties.

The Commission has issued directions for these seven parties to file their evidence and submissions in advance of the public hearing, which will commence on 19 November 2019.

- As outlined in decision GC18/19, the Commission will undertake a nationwide review of the contributions made by each casino to their independent charitable trust.
- The ongoing effective discharge of its licensing and appeal functions.
- Continue to meet with the sector.
- Review the Host Responsibility Programme for the Christchurch casino.
- Keep the Minister informed of developments relating to the Commission's functions.

# APPENDIX 1

## Duties and Functions of the Commission under the Act

The Commission is an independent decision-making body with the powers of a Commission of Inquiry. Its functions are wide-ranging, and include the following:

- specifying, varying and revoking casino licence conditions
- considering and determining applications for casino operators' licences and the renewal of casino venue licences
- approving agreements and changes to agreements between casino operators and casino venue licence holders
- considering and determining appeals against regulatory and licensing decisions made by the Department in respect of Class 3 and Class 4 gambling. Class 3 gambling involves prizes of more than \$5,000, but does not take place at a casino or involve gaming machines. Class 4 gambling relates to non-casino gaming machine operations
- considering and dealing with complaints about the way the Department has handled complaints in relation to Class 4 gambling
- advising the Minister for Internal Affairs on matters relating to the performance of the Commission's functions and the administration of the Act, either at the Minister's request or on its own initiative
- advising Ministers and facilitating consultation on the setting of the problem gambling levy.
