INTRODUCTION

By the Chief Gambling Commissioner

I am pleased to present to you my annual report for the period 1 July 2020 to 30 June 2021, the Commission's sixteenth full year of operation, and my second as Chief Gambling Commissioner.

The Commission has a mixture of regulatory, judicial and advisory functions in relation to gambling and the gambling sector. The functions most regularly exercised by the Commission involve determining applications for approval under casino licence conditions, amending casino licence conditions and considering appeals from gaming machine operators against decisions made by the Department of Internal Affairs (the "**Department**").

In the last year the Commission determined 121 applications to amend casino licence conditions or grant approvals under casino licence conditions, and five Class 4 appeals.

REPORT ON ACTIVITIES

Establishment of the Commission

The Commission was established in March 2004 by section 220 of the Gambling Act 2003 (the “Act”). The Act provides that the Commission shall comprise up to five Commissioners. The Commission is currently operating with four, rather than five, Commissioners.

The Chief Gambling Commissioner is Lisa Hansen, a Barrister based in Wellington. Lisa was a Gambling Commissioner from January 2011 to March 2020, when she was appointed as the Chief Gambling Commissioner. The other three Commissioners are:

- Donna Matahaere-Atariki, who is a Consultant and lives in Dunedin;
- Wendie Harvey, who is a professional Director and Business Consultant and lives in Hawke’s Bay; and
- Scott Pearson, who is a Business Consultant and lives in Auckland.

The Commission is serviced by an Auckland-based Secretariat.

The duties and functions of the Commission are set out in Appendix 1 to this report.

Casinos

The Commission is responsible for casino licensing, with the Department being responsible for operating and equipment standards, game rules and compliance. Casinos can appeal the Commission’s decisions on licensing matters to the High Court.

In the year ending 30 June 2021, the Commission made 121 decisions on applications to amend licence conditions or obtain approvals under licence conditions. Applications related mainly to approval of new signage around the casinos, revised floor layouts and new game mixes. This compares with 136 decisions made last year.

New Zealand has six casinos (new ones being prohibited under the Act), varying considerably in size, as shown below:

SKYCITY is the dominant operator in New Zealand, operating four of the six casinos: one in Auckland, one in Hamilton and two in Queenstown. The Auckland Casino is by far the largest, with approval to operate up to 150 table games, 1,877 gaming machines and 240 fully automated table games. The Auckland Casino previously operated up to 110 gaming tables and 1,647 gaming machines but can now deploy additional gambling products up to the abovementioned levels pursuant to the New Zealand International Convention Centre Act 2013, which gives effect to the New Zealand International Convention Centre Project and Licensing Agreement between SKYCITY and the Crown.

SKYCITY Wharf closed temporarily in 2020 due to the impact of COVID-19 on tourist numbers and on its ability to staff the venue. The Casino will remain closed for the foreseeable future.

Dunedin Casino is undertaking the preparatory work necessary to make an application to renew its casino venue licence pursuant to section 134 of the Act. The Commission has approved individuals who are independent of Dunedin Casino to prepare a Casino Impact Report which will accompany Dunedin Casino’s licence renewal application.

Appeals to the Commission

The Department exercises primary licensing and enforcement functions in relation to non-casino gambling (gaming machines and large-scale lotteries).

Operators have rights of appeal to the Commission against decisions made by the Department in circumstances including loss of licence, enforcement action and in relation to the imposition of licence conditions by the Department.

The Commission determined five appeals in the year ending 30 June 2021.

An appeal is heard on a *de novo* basis, meaning that the Commission considers the matter afresh.

Decision GC21-20 – Appeal by Waitara Town & Country Club against a refusal to grant a Class 4 operator’s licence

Waitara Town & Country Club appealed against a decision by the Secretary refusing the Club’s application for a Class 4 operator’s licence. The application was declined because the Secretary was not satisfied that the Club’s gambling operation was financially viable. The Secretary was also not satisfied about the Club’s suitability, having regard to the Club’s past non-compliance with the Act.

The appeal to the Commission turned on two matters. First, the Commission’s assessment of the financial viability of the Club’s gambling operation and secondly, whether the Commission was satisfied about the Club’s suitability having regard to past non-compliance.

The Commission confirmed the Secretary’s refusal to grant a Class 4 operator’s licence. It was not satisfied, based on the information before it, that the Club’s gambling operation was financially viable or of the Club’s suitability, having regard to the Club’s past non-compliance with the Act.

Decision GC03-21 – Appeal by Pub Charity Limited against a decision of the Secretary for Internal Affairs regarding Class 4 venue licence conditions for Matata Hotel

Pub Charity appealed against a decision by the Secretary to issue a new venue licence for Matata Hotel with a commencement date of 14 August 2020 and a condition that no more than 9 machines may

be operated. The primary focus of the appeal was the conditional grandparented right to operate more than 9 machines created by section 92, which depends on the venue never being without a venue licence for more than 6 months, and the exercise of the Commission’s power to backdate a licence when issued (in order to preserve the necessary statutory continuity).

After determining when the previously surrendered licence had come to an end (a new matter) and deciding to issue a backdated licence (in accordance with previously outlined principles) because of the effect of the COVID-19 Alert Level restrictions in 2020, the Commission turned to consider whether the venue would be entitled to operate up to 14 machines (as sought) if the licence were backdated. Because of issues which had not been addressed by the parties in their initial submissions, it posed questions to the parties and sought additional submissions.

After considering the additional submissions (which were broadly consistent), the Commission concluded that the maximum number of machines which a venue was in fact permitted to operate depended **both** on the stated maximum number in a condition **and** the concurrent existence of at least an equivalent number of individual machine approvals and that, as a result of a widespread historical misunderstanding about the need for the latter, the prior licence had contained approval for only 5 identified machines, despite stating a 14 machine maximum.

It was apparent that a strict application of the Act’s provisions, as clarified by the Commission, would produce a result unexpected by both the Secretary and venue licence holders such as the appellant and would also deprive many licence holders of rights which both they and the Secretary assumed had been preserved, a situation caused by past practices adopted or endorsed by the Secretary. In order to provide relief to the appellant against what it saw as a potentially unfair outcome, the Commission referred the application back to the Secretary with directions to issue a licence which would remedy the position satisfactorily. It also suggested that steps be taken to provide similar relief to other licence holders in similar circumstances who sought to remedy their position.

The Commission is aware that its decision on the proper construction of the Act has created new operational issues for the Secretary. If the resulting position is regarded as unsatisfactory, statutory amendment may be required. Further and fuller details about this decision can be obtained from the Commission’s website¹.

Decision GC04-21 – Appeal by New Zealand Community Trust against a refusal by the Secretary for Internal Affairs to agree to cessation of gambling at Flannagan’s Irish Pub

New Zealand Community Trust (NZCT) appealed against a decision by the Secretary refusing to agree to the gambling activity at Flannagan’s Irish Pub ceasing for a period longer than 4 weeks.

After the Secretary questioned the Commission’s jurisdiction to hear an appeal against a decision declining to agree to an extended period of cessation of gambling, the Commission decided to consider and determine the jurisdiction question in advance, and separately from the substantive appeal issues, on the basis that, if a valid appeal were held to have been commenced, it would then seek submissions on the substantive merits and decide the appeal. It sought and received submissions on the question of whether NZCT had a right to appeal the refusal to agree to the Venue remaining inactive for longer than 4 weeks.

The Commission concluded that it lacked jurisdiction to hear the appeal. It held that, as a matter of construction of the current appeal provision, section 77(1), a decision by the Secretary to refuse to agree to a request to extend the period of inactivity under section 71(1)(g) is not one of the decisions for which there is a right of appeal; it is merely something on which the Secretary may rely in making a subsequent decision which would then be subject to a right of appeal.

In doing so, the Commission set out the legislative history, resolved a conflict in two of its earlier decisions and provided some guidance about communications by the Secretary and the steps which licence holders should take in the circumstances in order to preserve appeal rights under the existing appeal provisions.

Miscellaneous

In the year ended 30 June 2020, the Commission maintained regular contact with stakeholders, including representatives from all six casinos, the Class 4 sector, the Department, the Ministry of Health and treatment providers. The Commission also liaised with gambling regulators in Australian jurisdictions and briefed them on the Commission’s work.

The Commission continues to keep abreast of relevant gambling issues at both governance and management levels.

Procedures

In exercising its functions, the Commission has wide powers to determine its own procedures, to engage experts and to receive evidence. The policies and procedures developed by the Commission, and the decisions which it makes, are all published on its website.

Appeal proceedings are run along judicial lines. Procedures involve filing of submissions and affidavit evidence by the appellant, submissions and evidence in response by the respondent Secretary, and submissions and evidence in reply from the appellant.

The Commission consults on applications to amend licence conditions with the casino licence holder, the Secretary and affected persons.

The Commission can, and does, obtain independent legal advice in relation to matters under consideration – both casino applications and appeals.

Apart from its decisions, the Commission (mainly through the Commission Secretariat) communicates on an ongoing basis with stakeholders.

Administration

Under the Act, the Commission has no power to acquire, hold or alienate property, or to employ staff. Instead, the Act requires the Department to service the Commission, by arranging the administrative services necessary for the Commission to perform its functions.

The Act also requires the Commission to make decisions independently of the Minister and the Secretary, and to have a stand-alone office. This is located in Auckland.

The Commission is funded from the Department’s Vote but, as noted above, is functionally independent. The Commission’s annual expenditure is variable, depending upon the volume of applications and appeals before it, and any litigation with which it is involved.

Commission Meetings

The Commission met 11 times during the year under review: 10 July, 7 August, 11 September, 9 October, 6 November, 11 December 2020, and 5 February, 5 March, 9 April, 7 May and 4 June 2021.

The Executive Director attended the Australasian Casino & Gaming Regulators' CEOs meeting by videoconference on 31 May 2021.

Gambling Commissioners and the Executive Director attended the Annual Conference of Australasian Gambling Regulators in Hobart by videoconference on 31 May and 1 June 2021.

Future Directions

The focus of the Commission in 2021/2022 will be the following activities:

- A major piece of work for the Commission for the next year will be to undertake a review of the contributions made by each casino to their independent charitable trust.
- Another major piece of work will be making recommendations to responsible Ministers on the total amount of the proposed Problem Gambling Levy for the period 1 July 2022 to 30 June 2025, and the proposed levy rate for each gambling sector. This is a task undertaken by the Commission every three years pursuant to section 318 of the Act.
- The ongoing effective discharge of its licensing and appeal functions.
- Continue to meet with the sector.
- Keep the Minister informed of developments relating to the Commission's functions.

APPENDIX 1

Duties and Functions of the Commission under the Act

The Commission is an independent decision-making body with the powers of a Commission of Inquiry. Its functions are wide-ranging, and include the following:

- specifying, varying and revoking casino licence conditions
- considering and determining applications for casino operators' licences and the renewal of casino venue licences
- approving agreements and changes to agreements between casino operators and casino venue licence holders
- considering and determining appeals against regulatory and licensing decisions made by the Department in respect of Class 3 and Class 4 gambling. Class 3 gambling involves prizes of more than \$5,000, but does not take place at a casino or involve gaming machines. Class 4 gambling relates to non-casino gaming machine operations
- considering and dealing with complaints about the way the Department has handled complaints in relation to Class 4 gambling
- advising the Minister for Internal Affairs on matters relating to the performance of the Commission's functions and the administration of the Act, either at the Minister's request or on its own initiative
- advising Ministers and facilitating consultation on the setting of the problem gambling levy.
